4-14, Friday, 1:08 a.m. I am working the 4 p.m. to 12 a.m. shift but finding myself there all the time.

Those poor little guys need us so much.

Never before have I seen a group of people like there is here. I've seen grown men cry. I've cried again tonight as I lost another otter. I've been working with No. 109 for the past four days that he's been here. I didn't dare name him, like I did Sweet Pea, a juvenile female doing well. He was heavily oiled when he came in and had ingested a lot.

I see the different stages of toxin poisoning here. Same as Orlando. Only difference is we've dealt with it for the past few years. Our waterways are so pol-

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
